CASE Notes: School Counseling



We are nearing an end to the regularly presented curriculum, Second Step. Both counselors have been adding in additional lessons on Jobs and Careers.

We have been learning about different jobs and careers in the community, and tools and skills that are required for different jobs and careers. Share with your child what tools are needed for your job or career. Talk with them about what it took for you to learn how to do your job or career.

On the individual front, counselors continue to meet with individual students or small groups of students to assist in identifying feelings, address disagreements, and practice making good decisions.

At Lakeview Elementary we are lucky to have two Professional School Counselors with years of experience that are available all day long. Mrs. Swenson presents lessons in grades 3 through 5 classrooms in the mornings and is in the office to receive individual students in the afternoons. Mrs. Kirkland is in the office in the mornings to receive individuals that need a counselor and teaches her classroom lessons in the afternoons to grades TK through 2.

Coach's Corner: Jenny Durham

All grade levels are finishing up with universal screening in the areas of reading and math. Teachers continue to analyze student learning using reports from FastBridge and classroom data. FastBridge is a web-based assessment system that helps educators identify and monitor student progress. Then, a school-wide approach provides different levels of support to all students based on their needs. Students who need reading or math interventions receive instruction in the classroom through individual and/or small group instruction. Some K-5 students receive targeted support in reading with one of our Reading Interventionists or through our K-3 Reading Corps program. If a student needs more intensive support, they might receive one-to-one interventions. Student progress is closely monitored and adjusted as needed.

The Principals, Instructional Coach, and each K-5 grade level team, met during a scheduled time on a day in January, to discuss the Bridge to Practice activities suggested in the LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading Spelling) learning platform. During each grade level meeting, teachers shared examples of what Bridge to Practice activities they have tried or would like to try in their literacy instruction. Our conversations focused on how phonological skills should be taught and what phonological skills should be assessed. Next steps with word recognition and phonological awareness were discussed.

During our professional development time in February, teachers will begin Unit 3 in LETRS. This unit will focus on teaching beginning phonics, word recognition, and spelling. We will examine the foundational aspects of phonics instruction, teaching students how to decode and recognize basic words, and laying the groundwork for spelling skills by emphasizing the connection between sounds and letters.
