CASE Notes: School Counseling

Our Centerville Rotary helps us recognize students through the Student of the Month program.

To determine Student of the Month, we use the Character Counts program's Six Pillars of Character. When students learn these character skills, they are more engaged, responsible and productive citizens. Mrs. Kirkland teaches our youngest learners (Kindergarten, 1st and 2nd grade) these character skills in CASE lessons.



CHARACTER COUNTS! helps students develop the Six Pillars of Character:

Trustworthiness

Have integrity, be honest, keep promises, and be loyal to values

Respect

Show acceptance and respect for others

Responsibility

Be accountable for actions, show perseverance and self-discipline

Fairness

Be open-minded and demonstrate good sportsmanship

Caring

Show compassion, gratitude, and forgiveness

Good Citizenship

Dedication to making choices that protect the safety and rights of others.

Coach's Corner: Jenny Durham

During our professional development time in March, teachers will engage in the second part of Unit 3 in LETRS. This unit will focus on teaching beginning phonics, word recognition, and spelling. We will examine the role of phonics in reading instruction. We will practice sound-blending, word practice and word meaning routines. We will also continue to learn how to use data to further student success.



During math intervention time, our small group and individual instruction is continuing to focus on foundational math concepts. First grade continues with the Number Sense intervention. Second grade has begun intervention work in the Meaning of the Equal Sign. Third grade continues with the Meaning of the Equal Sign intervention. Fourth and fifth grades continue with fraction understanding during their intervention time. Instruction is focused on number line understanding which is an essential component for a keen awareness of many fraction concepts.
